ROLE OF COOPERATIVE EDUCATIONAL SERVICE AGENCIES

Cooperative Educational Service Agencies (CESAs) serve educational needs in all areas of Wisconsin by being the liaisons between the DPI and school districts. Because they work on a regional cooperative basis, CESAs are able to economically and efficiently provide collaborative programs and services requested by local school districts and other educational entities.

In 1963, the Wisconsin legislature created 19 CESAs which functioned from July 1, 1965 to July 1, 1984, at which time the CESAs were reorganized into 12 regions as directed by the 1983 legislative session.

The currently operating 12 CESAs provide a multitude of programs and services to school districts and other educational agencies throughout Wisconsin. Many of these services would not be feasible for individual school districts or agencies relying on their own resources, but they are available due to the CESAs' cooperative methods.

Examples of services provided include school improvement services; special education; technical support and professional development; safe and healthy schools initiatives; administrative software support; data collection, analysis and follow-up action planning; distance learning; alternative instruction; early childhood networking; parental support; media and technology services; in-school television and creation of documentaries, and overall professional development opportunities. CESAs provide specific programs that school districts identify as priority needs, and a number of schools jointly share the services and costs.

Each CESA is governed by the school districts it serves via a Board of Control consisting of one school board member from each of 11 school districts within that CESA. The Board of Control determines agency policies; obtains agency funding; approves service contracts with school districts, counties and other CESAs; assesses pro rata service costs to local school districts; authorizes money spent for equipment, space, and personnel; and contracts an agency administrator. The agency administrator coordinates the services provided to local school districts by the agency. This person also coordinates programs for the professional advisory committee, which is composed of the chief school administrator of each district in the CESA. The committee advises the agency administrator regarding services needed, and this information is then presented to the Board of Control.

Educators throughout the state share their enthusiasm with the DPI concerning the fine job CESAs are doing to help the school districts meet the challenge of educational standards and accountability. CESAs have generated a new meaning for the words "cooperation" and "sharing" as they relate to school improvement.

Through their efforts, CESAs have become a viable partner with the districts and the DPI as numerous parties strive to improve education and meet the needs of children.

Major Accomplishments in 2010-11:

- Rolled out new design of the CESA 7 website and new address – www.cesa7.org.
- Worked with the SIS and RCC departments to successfully use the Teaming Portal to collaborate across the state and out-of-state with other Agencies, DPI, and districts on the roll-out of the Common Core State Standards.
- Installed the necessary equipment to be prepared for the 100Mbps Internet statewide roll-out.
- Replaced and upgraded the switching infrastructure at the CESA 7 Main Office.
- Upgraded the wireless infrastructure at the CESA 7 Main Office building to support separate LAN and guest wireless networks.
- Virtualized or retired 6 physical servers to reduce energy and cooling usage in the server rack.
- Continued moving away from proprietary systems to open source systems to keep software licensing costs to a minimum.
- Replaced the original roof on the CESA 7 Main Office building.
- Replaced carpeting in the hallways and reception area at the CESA 7 Main Office building.
- Painted the reception area and front hallway at the CESA 7 Main Office building.
- Upgraded 4 of the 7 toilets with better flushing technology to avoid blockages.
- Replaced the counter top in production room.
- Installed garbage disposals in the break room and Meeting Room C.
- Worked with the Agency Administrator to form partnerships with vendors to offer discounted services to districts.

- Hosted 12 student trainings, teaching research-based Peer-to-Peer skills and programs to 296 students.
- Was awarded and coordinates the ATOD 3-year State Grant for a consortium of 4 school districts (Algoma, Chilton, Kohler and Washington Island.) (\$53,500 per year).
- Coordinated the ATOD Student Mini Grant Competition awarding 12 CESA 7 schools with \$1,000.00 grants.
- Trained to be a facilitator to help districts implement Professional Learning Communities.
- External Coach for PBIS in several districts
- Trained 7 school buildings on how to use School Wide Information System (SWIS) for progress monitoring of student behavior
- Trained my first school building in Tier 2 PBIS Check In/Check Out progress monitoring tool for student behavior.
- Presented at the Tribes International Summit how PBIS braids with the Tribes TLC® Process

- To attend the training of trainers workshop on Evidence Based Behavior Interventions at the Safe and Civil Conference, these skills to help school choose interventions for their behavior problem students
- To educate in and support the state wide PBIS initiative with coaching services available to districts
- To build district capacity to utilize SWIS and the three tier tool of data collection on behavior; to make data driven decisions on behavioral student interventions.
- To guide and coach schools through building Professional Learning Communities
- To offer to school a 3-session AODA Education Service for students who violate the athletic code.

Additional Shared Services

Alternative Licensure Program Teacher Development Center (TDC) – Ron Tomes, Program Coordinator, and Jeff Dickert, Administrator

The CESA 7 Alternative Licensure Program Teacher Development Center (TDC) is a one-to-two year accelerated, performance based, intensive teacher preparation program. Candidates who want to be teachers and have a bachelor's degree or higher in high needs areas and are committed to children and learning are hired by school districts and taught and supported by the TDC program. The TDC is also a program for certified teachers who want to add ELL, Bilingual, Early Childhood or Cross Categorical Special Education certification to their existing license. The not-for-profit CESA 7 Teacher Development Center was created in direct response to school district needs for highly qualified teachers in specific fields where they could not find certified teachers.

The mission of the TDC Program is to provide teacher candidates with the knowledge, skills and dispositions needed to effectively meet the diverse educational needs of all children and youth in our schools.

There are currently 26 teacher candidates in the TDC program -8 candidates have a minimum of a Bachelor Degree and 18 candidates who are certified teachers adding on other special certifications to their license (3 new applications currently being processed).

In order for a person to be considered for the Teacher Development Center Program, the person must be hired by a school district in a high need area with an emergency license or permit. High need areas include but are not limited to the following areas: mathematics, science, technology education, business education, computer science, world languages, music, art, ELL, Bilingual, Early Childhood and Special Education.

The most extensive area of certification need in 2010-11 has been in the area of **English Language Learning (ELL)/Bilingual** with approximately **50%** of our candidates seeking licensure in this area; **Cross Categorical Special Education** with approximately **40%** of our candidates seeking licensure in this area; teaching **business education-5%**; teaching **science-5%** and teaching **Chinese 5%**.

For the 2010-11 school year, teacher candidates are working in eleven school districts in the CESA 7 area (Algoma, Cedar Grove-Belgium, Green Bay, Hilbert, Kewaunee, Luxemburg Casco, Sevastopol, Seymour, Sheboygan, Stockbridge and Sturgeon Bay), and one school district outside of the CESA 7 area (Menasha).

Districts, schools and CESA 7 work together to assure that candidates are learning while they are earning as employed teachers in schools. Depending upon the candidate's educational background and licensure need, the program can last from one to three years. CESA 7 partners with Silver Lake College to provide graduate level courses needed for teacher certification. The credits for courses completed in the TDC Program are considered electives in the Masters in Teacher Leadership Program at Silver Lake College. Kohl Teacher Fellowships and Student Excellence Scholarships – Pam Racine, Coordinator

The Kohl Teacher Fellowships and Student Excellence Scholarships provide opportunities for educators and students to be recognized for their accomplishments. For the teachers, the recognition is for teaching excellence and innovation. For the students, the recognition is for leadership, citizenship, school and community involvement, and academic achievement. Local, regional and state competitions provide stages of recognition promoted by CESA 7 through in kind donations of organization and time. The sponsor of the Kohl Teacher and Student Awards is U.S. Senator Herb Kohl.

Professional Advisory Committee (PAC) – Jeff Dickert, Administrator

The Professional Advisory Committee is composed of district administrators from the 37 CESA 7 school districts and the Oneida Nation School System (non-voting). This committee is required by Wisconsin Statute 116.05.* The purpose of this committee is to give advice to the Board of Control and to the CESA Administrator on the operations of CESA 7, as well as to provide professional growth opportunities for the members of the committee. Currently the committee meets monthly during the school year.

*116.05 Professional Advisory Committee: In each agency there shall be a professional advisory committee composed of the school district administrator of each school district in the agency, which shall meet at the request of the Board of Control or the Agency Administrator to advise them.

Resource Center – Margie Thomas

The CESA 7 Media Center, organized in 1991, was formed by combining materials from various consortiums within CESA 7 in order to have one main media center. The name was changed to CESA 7 Resource Center on July 1, 2006, to encompass the wide range of materials being offered.

Resource center members have access to and can check out a limited number of iPods, iPads. LiveScribe smart pens and SMARTBoards for pilot programs and evaluation purposes.



Approximately 1600 videos, some printed materials, CDs are housed in the Resource Center and are available to member schools within the CESA 7 region. CESA 7 co-sponsors the State Spelling Bee with the Wisconsin State Journal, Madison. There were four regional spelling contests within CESA 7 in 2011 and the champion from each of these contests advanced to Madison to compete in the State Spelling Bee. The winner of the state contest earns a trip to Washington D.C. and participates in the National Spelling Bee. The program is open to all 3rd-8th grade students in the CESA 7 public and private/parochial elementary/junior high schools at a per-school fee.

For the tenth consecutive year, Waukesha West represented Wisconsin at the National Finals. The competition was held on April 27-30 in Charlotte, NC. West brought home another National Title with a 1st place finish among Division II schools and 3rd overall in the nation. The team also earned 34 medals and \$ 6,000 in cash scholarships. Seven of West's nine team members earned cash scholarship awards; two of their decathletes achieved perfect scores in subjective tests.

Corresponding with the National Finals in Charlotte on April 27-30, Decathlon teams from Waukesha South, New Berlin Eisenhower and Marathon High Schools represented Wisconsin as the national **online** contenders in the large, medium and small school divisions respectively; results are pending.

Lead Sponsor's Commitment Will End in 2012:

Milwaukee-based **Assurant Health Foundation** has served as WIAD's lead sponsor since 2006. Assurant's six -year partnership will come to an end at the close of the 2011-2012 season.
